She paints a might river. A river deep and wide.	Water and paintbrush	 (If outside: use the paintbrush to paint your own 'river') Paint wet trails on hands and arms to feel the painting of the wet river
"My dragon needs a tail," says Shen, "And then it will be real. Yes, then it will be roaring And ready for a meal"	Two large lids to "snap" together as the dragon's jaws	 Roar, and pretend to eat your child as the hungry dragon. The dragon is scary! Practice saying 'stop!'
She paints a mound of golden rice, And cakes like little moons, And drums and flutes, till all the streets Ring out with merry tunes.	A favourite song Ribbons or scarves Shakers and instruments (you can make your own shaker from an empty, dry milk carton and some rice)	 Have a go and playing your instruments, and dancing to the music. Try making choices about which instrument you want Copy your child's rhythms, and see if they can copy yours!
